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the cyclops by stories from homer a cyclops in greek mythology and later roman mythology is a member of a primordial race of giants each with a single eye in the center of his forehead the word cyclops literally means round eyed or circle eyed hesiod described three one eyed cyclopes who served as builders blacksmiths and craftsmen brontes steropes and arges the sons of uranus and gaia brothers of the titans homer described another group of mortal herdsmen or shepherd cyclopes the sons of poseidon other accounts were written by the playwright euripides poet theocritus and roman epic poet virgil in hesiod s theogony zeus releases three cyclopes from the dark pit of tartarus they provide zeus thunderbolt hades helmet of invisibility and poseidon s trident and the gods use these weapons to defeat the titans

in ancient greece odysseus has angered powerful gods they send violent storms and monsters to stop the brave soldier from returning home from a ten year war the one eyed giant cyclops vows to eat odysseus and his men greek myth told in comic book format

introduces the concept of point of view through the cyclops polyphemus retelling of the classic greek myth odysseus

the cyclops is an ancient greek satyr play by euripides the only complete satyr play that has survived antiquity it is a comical burlesque like play on the same story depicted in book nine of homer s odyssey odysseus has lost his way on the voyage home from the trojan war he and his hungry crew make a stop in sicily at mount aetna which is inhabited by cyclopes they come upon the satyrs and their father silenus who have been separated from their goddionysus and enslaved by a cyclops named polyphemus in the odyssey these characters are not contained in the odyssey s version of the event their addition provides much of the humor due to their cowardly and drunken behavior

a retelling of how odysseus and his companions outwit the giant one eyed cyclops and escape from his cave

demonstrating a sense of the tragic while this view of human experience and society is customarily linked with greek tragedy rather than epic rinon uses close readings of the texts to argue persuasively that both the iliad and the odyssey present a view of pathos interwoven with the knowledge that it is unavoidable and inexplicable using aristotle s poetics as a guide toward defining eutuchia and dystuchia rinon analyzes specific sections of the epics he touches on the cyclops episode and its use of bakhtinian heteroglossia on the use of hephaestus creativity in both epics in the emergence of tragic signification and on demodocus songs in book 8 of the odyssey as seen through andré gide s mise en abîme other detailed readings look at individual themes and characters in the poems including the image of the dog the speeches in the ninth book of the iliad and numerous minor characters yoav rinon s integration of classical philology narratology and post colonial studies makes homer and the dual model of the tragic a widely interdisciplinary book one that will appeal to both specialists and undergraduates in comparative literature philosophy and classical studies

euripides and the boundaries of the human presents the first single volume reading in nearly fifty years of all of euripides surviving plays rather than examining one or a

handful of dramas in monograph or article form mark ringer insists on the thematic and stylistic parallels that unite a diverse canon of works euripides is often referred to as the most modern of the three ancient greek tragedians but in what way can the work of this fifth century b c artist be claimed as modern the multi layered presentation of character is new within the context of athenian tragedy the plays also reveal equal concern with the preservation and re vitalization of tradition especially with respect to the portrayal of the olympian gods euripidean drama upholds tradition just as vigorously as it posits a new kind of realism in character portrayal in the ancient theatre euripidean drama fuses what was old with what was new in order to revitalize and perpetuate the art of tragedy this book will be of interest to professionals and students in the fields of classics greek drama in translation or in the original greek theater studies comparative literature tragedy and religion

in this collection of his essays on homer some new and some appearing for the first time in english the distinguished scholar pietro pucci examines the linguistic and rhetorical features of the poet s works arguing that there can be no purely historical interpretation given that the parameters of interpretation are themselves historically determined pucci focuses instead on two features of homer s rhetoric repetition of expression formulae and its effects on meaning and the issue of intertextuality

the cyclops of greek myth tells the story of his life including his famous encounter with odysseus he is a man not the monster of myth although he is extremely large very powerful and has but one good eye he tells the story of his troubled childhood his friendship with his little sister anastasia his love for his mother thoosa and his fraught pursuit of the beautiful island shepherdess galatea it is a story of loneliness banishment suffering love and triumph you will love galatea s down to earth character and anastasia s boundless energy and endless tricks just as he is not the monster of myth neither is odysseus the great hero in fact odysseus is a piratical raider who plunders cities like the city of the cicones he comes to polyphemus s island not because he is

blown off course by unfavorable winds but because he wishes to steal food and wine for himself and his crew although the encounter with odysseus takes only two days of his life polyphemus s take on that encounter is very different from the homeric version and makes fascinating reading

this volume presents a sophisticated and intricate examination of the parallels between sanskrit and greco roman literature by means of a philological and literary analysis morales harley hypothesizes that greco roman literature was known understood and recreated in india moreover it is argued that the techniques for adapting epic into theater could have been greco roman influences in india and that some of the elements adapted within the literary motifs specifically the motifs of the embassy the ambush and the ogre could have been greco roman borrowings by sanskrit authors this book draws on a wide variety of sources including iliad phoenix rhesus and cyclops greco roman as well as mahābhārata the embassy the five nights and the middle one sanskrit the result is a well supported argument which presents us with the possibility of cultural exchange between the greco roman world and india a possibility which though hypothetical is worth acknowledging due to its comparative nature this volume will appeal to both indologists and classicists including mahābhārata scholars sanskrit theater scholars and those interested in comparative work with sanskrit literature it brings an original perspective to the field and provides inspiration for new lines of research
